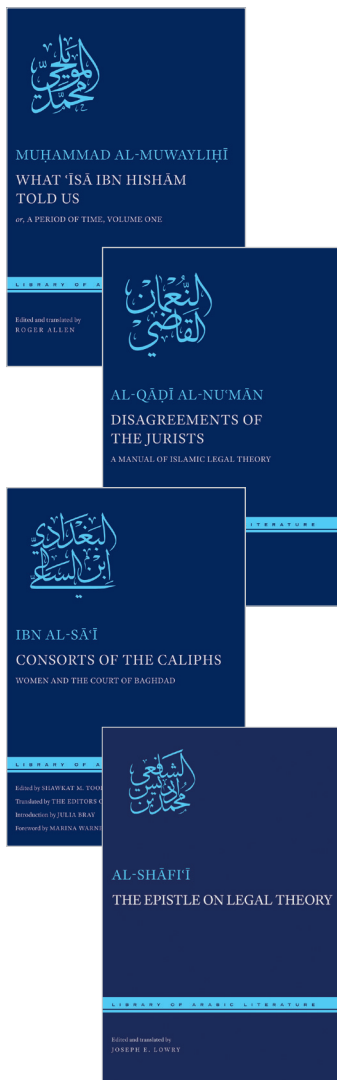

The Library of Arabic Literature series produces bilingual editions of key works of classical and pre-modern Arabic literature, in new editions of the Arabic text and new English translations. Books in the series are edited and translated by distinguished scholars of Arabic and Islamic studies, and are published in parallel-text format with Arabic and English on facing pages.

The Library of Arabic Literature includes texts from the pre-Islamic era to the cusp of the modern period, and encompasses a wide range of genres, including poetry, poetics, fiction, religion, philosophy, law, science, history, and historiography.

The Library has published twelve books in the last two years, with many more titles in the works. In this presentation, several of the Library's editors and translators—all Penn-affiliated—will discuss the challenges of editing this literary heritage and translating it into English for a contemporary readership of scholars, students and a general audience:

Professor ROGER ALLEN (University of Pennsylvania, emeritus), a member of the International Advisory Board of the Library of Arabic Literature and editor-translator of *What 'Isā ibn Hishām Told Us* by Muḥammad al-Muwayliḥī.

Professor DEVIN STEWART (Emory University) is an Editor of the Library of Arabic Literature and editor-translator of the forthcoming *Disagreements of the Jurists*, by al-Qāḍī al-Nu'mān.

Professor SHAWKAT TOORAWA (Cornell University) is an Executive Editor of the Library of Arabic Literature and the editor of the forthcoming *Consorts of the Caliphs*, by Ibn al-Sā'ī.

CHIP ROSSETTI is Managing Editor of the Library of Arabic Literature. He is pursuing a Ph.D. at Penn on Iraqi fiction and is an acclaimed translator, most recently of *Beirut, Beirut* by Sonallah Ibrahim.

Professor JOSEPH LOWRY (University of Pennsylvania), an Editor of the Library of Arabic Literature and editor-translator of *The Epistle on Legal Theory*, by al-Shāfi'ī.
